The Last Mount Seymour Fire Update

As promised last month, here is what we have learned about the Mount Seymour fire. This information comes from a recent [North Shore News article](#).

The final cause of the Mt Seymour fire is still technically “undetermined” but investigators believe it was started by humans, and that is what is shown on the official incident page. No specific cause of the fire was identified, though there is evidence that humans were using the hut in the area of the fire. Critically, there is no evidence of natural causes (like lightning) so it was almost certainly started by people.

Apparently there are 50 – 100 other cabins in the area. It seems these were created many years ago. There are plans to remove them, but no timeline for that work yet.

Unless something changes, this is the last update on the Mt. Seymour fire. If you want to read the full story, the article above and [our own website](#) document the fire more fully.

If another fire like the one on Mt. Seymour happens and poses a threat, how will you find out about it? The North Shore uses the Alertable app to send messages about major events in our area. It's free, and we have [more information on our website](#), including links to the app in the App Store and Google Play.



Strengthening Emergency Response on the North Shore

With wildfires across BC and internationally, there have been many concerns raised about the North Shore's ability to handle emergencies. These concerns are exacerbated by the limiting geography of the North Shore, which leads to choke points that could cause worry in the event of an evacuation. Residents of Blueridge have been reaching out to our office discussing these worries, with only two roads crossing the Seymour River, not to mention the already strained bottlenecks of the Ironworkers and Lions Gate bridges. These are issues the province has been aware of, and we are taking action on solutions.

In 2017, we created the Community Emergency Preparedness Fund (CEPF), with an initial \$164 million investment. This money went to over 1500 projects for local government to strengthen emergency services and responses. In 2023, another \$180 million was added and will be distributed across BC. The North Shore received a significant share of the funding for multiple projects over the years. Some of the recent projects that have been funded for the North Shore through the CEPF include:

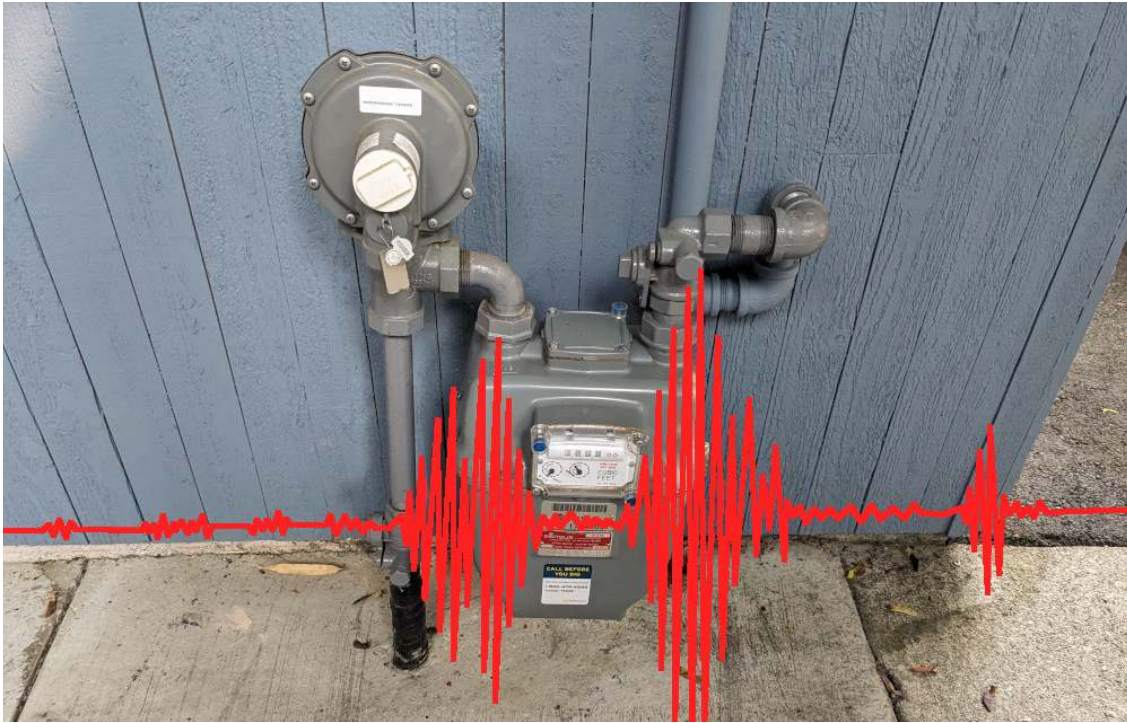
- \$73,681 to enhance the North Shore Emergency Operations Centre. The North Shore EOC coordinates response to any emergency needs locally, and has accounted for the potential of traffic gridlock by creating 7 zones with local supply caches for damage assessment, evacuations, public safety, and group lodging. North Shore Emergency Management handles this work and regularly submits projects to the CEPF to ensure their response is updated and as efficient as possible.
 - \$90,000 towards evacuation route planning on the North Shore involving all three Municipalities and both First Nations Governments. In 2010, North Shore Emergency Management completed an evacuation plan, which is updated with changing demographics, routes, and practices. This
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funding went towards drills and practices, as well as updated plans.

- \$2 million to the Tsleil-Waututh Nation for shoreline adaptation projects which include creating hazard maps, risk assessments, and completing small structural projects to ensure routes along the shoreline are in good condition, safe from erosion, floods, and landslides.
- \$369,066 to North Vancouver District for the creation of the North Shore Resilience Framework, which includes risk assessment, capacity analysis and workshops to improve resilience to climate disasters like fires, floods, and landslides.

There have been many other projects, such as an ongoing study into the capacity and long-term plans for our two bridges, but these are the most recent ones. North Vancouver District Firefighters have also purchased a couple of pumps to improve coastal fire response, especially up Indian Arm. Finally, one assurance we want to leave residents of Blueridge with is the advantage of living near such a large urban area. There are eyes everywhere - fires here have been spotted very quickly, before there are able to grow too out of control. The recent fire on Seymour was a great demonstration of that, with water bombers quickly deployed to keep the fire from spreading.

Automatic Gas Shut-Off Valve – Group Purchasing Opportunity Update

An enthusiastic response to the August *Blueridge Bulletin* article on automatic gas shut-off valves was received and I'm happy to share an update with our community.

Based on the number of people that sent an email to

valvepurchase@blueridgeca.org

I am confident that we will secure enough participants to encourage discounted supply and installation rates. If you haven't yet responded, don't worry as it's not too late! I am still gathering information and hoping to find financial supports for our program to make it accessible to as many residents as possible.

As part of my research into this topic, I sent a list of questions to the DNV building department. The response I received confirms the following:

1. The current BC building code does not require installation of an automatic gas shut-off valve for new builds, nor does the DNV expect the anticipated 'retrofit code' for existing buildings to contemplate these valves. This is surprising to me and may be related to the focus on electrification; however, we should be mitigating current risks!
 2. The DNV is not aware of any provincial upcoming programs or policies that would require installation of these valves through property transfer as
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in other seismic hot spots, such as Los Angeles.

3. DNV requested further information on our potential group purchasing program in order to assess whether they could come to the table with grants or other incentives to increase participation. Blueridge could make for an interesting pilot program that gives the DNV valuable data and insights into motivations, cost tolerance etc. before expanding a proactive program such as this!

I've started making enquiries with local plumbing / gas contractors to gauge interest in discounting the supply and installation of these valves. I hope to hear back shortly, once we are through summer vacations, in order to share firmer pricing. FortisBC is also on my list, recognizing that they may be interested in promoting the use of these valves.

Thank you to those who shared their ideas and suggestions in their emails, such as reaching out to our local Minister of Emergency Management and Climate Readiness, who I am certain would be interested in hearing about this program.

Your patience is appreciated and I look forward to sharing even more information in the next bulletin. In the meantime, feel free to use the email above for expressing interest or sharing ideas and feedback on this program.

This was a scary incident. Clearly wildfire is not to be ignored. Fire danger in our area is significant, and we all need to be cautious. As this event shows, even a single cigarette could cause a major incident.

Savoring Late Summer with a Burst of Flavor: The Burrata Salad

August slipped away, leaving us at September's doorstep—the gateway to a busy harvest season. With farmers markets overflowing with summer's treasures—vibrant squashes, cucumbers, salad greens, sweet carrots, and my personal favourite, colourful tomatoes—the essence of the season is beautifully captured in one dish: the Burrata Salad.

To celebrate the season of harvest, I thought I'd share a simple recipe that I use

to mark this season of freshness and abundance.

Burrata Salad with Balsamic Glaze and Fresh Basil

Ingredients:

For the Salad:

- 1 large or 2 small Burrata cheese balls
- 2 cups mixed salad greens (e.g., arugula, spinach, or mixed baby greens)
- Tomatoes, halved... the more the merrier
- 1/4 red onion, thinly sliced
- 1/4 cup fresh basil leaves
- Salt and black pepper to taste

For the Balsamic Glaze:

- 1/2 cup balsamic vinegar
- 2 tablespoons honey or maple syrup (adjust to taste)

Instructions:

Prepare the Balsamic Glaze:

- In a small saucepan, combine the balsamic vinegar and honey or maple syrup.
- Bring the mixture to a gentle simmer over medium heat.
- Reduce the heat to low and let it simmer for about 10-15 minutes, or until the mixture has thickened to a syrup-like consistency. Keep a close eye on it to prevent burning.

Assemble the Salad:

- Arrange mixed salad greens on a serving platter or individual salad plates.
 - Place the Burrata cheese ball(s) in the center or on one side of the greens.
 - Scatter your tomatoes and thinly sliced red onion over the salad greens.
 - Tear the Burrata cheese open gently to reveal the creamy interior, and arrange the creamy part and torn pieces over the salad.
 - Tear the fresh basil leaves and scatter them over the salad.
 - Season the salad with a pinch of salt and a sprinkle of freshly ground black pepper to enhance the flavors.
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Serve and Enjoy:

- Serve the Burrata salad immediately as an appetizer or light main course.
- Make sure to provide some crusty bread on the side!
- If you're feeling adventurous, add some balled or diced watermelon to the mix to add a burst of sweetness to the salad.

To request your free plants, fill out the online form linked above before September 15, 2023.

All plants are available while supplies last. We'll be providing substitutions if any plant species run out.

After you submit your request

You'll receive a confirmation email after submitting the online form. We'll also email you approximately two weeks before the plant pick up days (Oct. 21 and 22) with more information about pickup times and parking, etc.

Picking up your trees or shrubs

You can pick up your plants at the Maplewood Flats Conservation Area (2649 Dollarton Hwy) on October 21 or 22, 2023.

Lawn Watering Still Prohibited

A quick reminder: All of Metro Vancouver is still in ***Stage 2 Water Restrictions***. [All lawn watering is prohibited](#) until things change, and fines for violating these rules are potentially large.

To avoid any problems, simply let your grass go dormant. It will come back in the fall with the rains, and there will be more water for other uses in the meantime.

In a normal year, lawn watering is limited until Oct 15 - though that can be extended if needed - so plan on keeping your sprinklers put away until at least that date. When things change, we'll let you know here and on the [BCA website](#).



Speaking Of Water

All of BC is experiencing some level of drought. This has worsened our wildfire season and strained every local ecosystem. Metro Vancouver is in Drought Level 5 - "Adverse Impacts Almost Certain" - at the time of writing. And that's after the rains in early August.

The [BC Drought Information Portal](#) has a map of current conditions which is updated regularly, along with other information about stream and watershed conditions. But even without digging into the details, drought is clearly a worsening problem, as you can [read on any news site](#).

But what can we do? The obvious answer is to use less water, and there are simple ways that can be accomplished as explained on the [BC Drought Information page](#):

- Not watering lawns
 - Take shorter showers
 - Fill the sink instead of letting the water run while washing dishes
 - Turn off the tap while brushing your teeth or shaving
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- Run full loads of laundry and in the dishwasher
- Collect and reuse water for outdoor plants
- Plant drought tolerant vegetation
- Regularly check for and fix leaks inside and out

But individual actions can only go so far. As climate change kicks in even more, we're all going to learn new things, like which crops require more water, and which products use the most water when they are made. We'll probably be changing our consumption habits in time, to take such things into account. The alternative is adding more reservoir capacity, which is a complicated and enormously costly undertaking.

Remember what they say in California: Whiskey's for drinking and water's for fighting over. That quote's been attributed to Mark Twain, but it appears [that's not true](#).



Bears and Bins!

At the North Shore Black Bear Society, we continue to receive reports from all over the North Shore of bears getting into garbage bins.

“Garbage bins?”, you say. “Why would that be? There shouldn’t be anything in a garbage bin that a bear would want to eat!”

Right! That’s what we say! So, we thought maybe it’s time for a quiz. (Bear with

us, we're trying to make garbage fun). The name of this quiz is:

WHICH BIN?

Possible answers are:

- **G** (garbage)
- **R** (recycling, which for our purposes includes blue bin, grey bin (glass) and yellow bag (paper), and also soft plastics which should be taken to the Recycling Depot)
- **O** (organics, i.e. food waste and yard trimmings)
- **SS** – this stands for Simply Scrub, which is what we want you to do to your bins after garbage day. (Actually, this isn't one of the answers, but look what I did with the letters there.)

Let's play **Which Bin!** Select the answer that applies to each of these items:

1. Chicken Bones
2. Empty take out container
3. Grease from the BBQ grease trap
4. Empty pickle jar
5. Chip bag
6. Carrot and banana peels
7. Old broken tent poles
8. Empty cat food can
9. Plate scrapings
10. Grass clippings
11. Bonus question: Soiled diapers

Write your answers down, and tally up your score.

Answers:

1. O - freeze first along with any other meat or fish scraps
 2. R – wash with hot, soapy water first
 3. O – freeze first
 4. R - wash with hot, soapy water first
 5. R – rinse and take to recycle depot with other soft plastics
 6. O – wrap fruit and veggie scraps in newspaper and layer in the bin with yard trimmings
 7. G – just toss 'em! It's a great time to clean out the camping shed
 8. R - wash with hot, soapy water first

9. O –freeze meat, fish or chicken bits first
10. O – great for layering with fruit and vegetable scraps
11. Bonus Answer: G – these are a surprisingly strong bear attractant. Please flush the solids, wrap the diapers thoroughly and store indoors until garbage day. GROSS!

Scores:

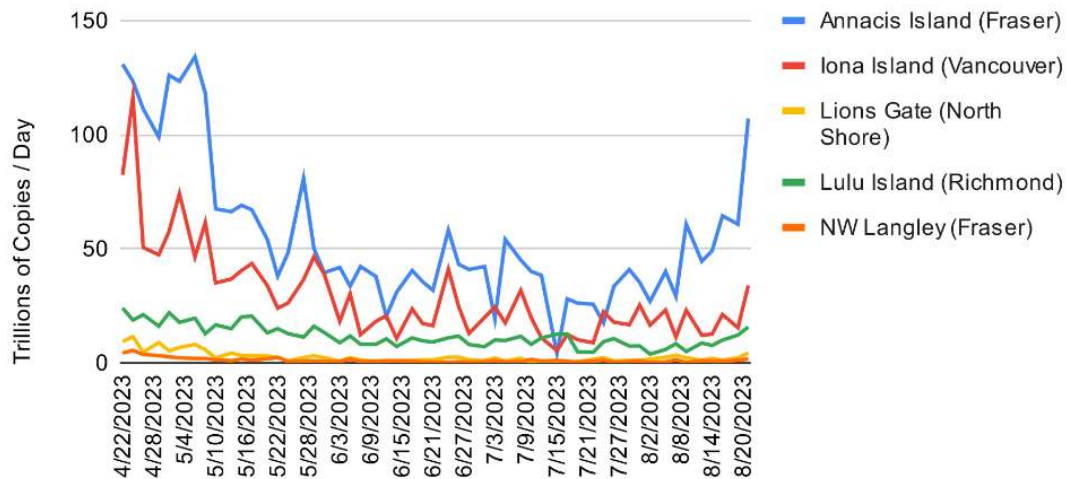
- 1-3 – Hmm, have you had a lot of ursine visits lately?
- 4-6 – Better, but remember a bear can smell 2000 times better than we can.
- 7-10 – Good job! You’ve “bear”ly got any attractants in your garbage bin.
- 11 - WOW! You’re an amazing ally for our bears and you probably never have to clean up spilled waste!

On a more serious note, we ask everyone to scrub all their bins out with vinegar after they have been emptied. Using a 50/50 solution of a pine scented cleaner in a spray bottle to spritz around your bins can also help deter black bears. Pop those frozen bits of food waste and grease (and any wrapping from meat, fish or chicken) into the appropriate bin the morning of collection. You can get a fine for setting your bins or recycling out before 5:30 am of collection day! If your bins have been damaged, please contact [DNV.org/repairs](https://www.dnv.org/repairs) for free cart repairs. They are very busy right now, so it may take a few weeks.

Thanks for playing **Which Bin!** Remember, there should be no bear attractant in your garbage bin, as it is emptied later in the day than the organics bin. Please follow our tips to prevent messes and to keep our bears safe, and report any wildlife sightings or attractants to us at www.northshorebears.com.

The Return of COVID

Your editor clearly has way too much time on his hands. The chart above is made from the regularly published data about the COVID virus levels in wastewater for the five Metro Vancouver water treatment plants. (The charts available from Metro Vancouver are... ah... I'll just call them "less than ideal." Sadly, the same is true for similar charts published by the Province, so I made my own.)

What the chart shows is that COVID is getting more common since about the middle of July. It's particularly obvious in the blue Annacis Island plant data, but when you look at the running average of each plant individually, they are all increasing again. Some are just barely starting to go up, but mid-July was the bottom of the most recent COVID cycle, and Annacis Island tends to lead the other plants and show the strongest signal.

There are at least two reasons for the increase. First, immunity from past vaccination or booster shots may be waning. Unfortunately it doesn't last forever and many people didn't get even one booster shot. And second, the newest virus variants are getting better at avoiding what immunity we have as a population, whether that immunity comes from a vaccine, a previous COVID infection, or both.

Thankfully a new batch of vaccines is coming out soon that are tailored to more recent COVID variants, and they show efficacy against even the latest strains that are making headlines. Once the new shots are available It will be time to get boosted again if you are eligible. Your editor will be getting his next booster as soon as possible. I hope you'll consider doing the same thing.

If you are curious, a larger set of charts - including virus levels going back to May of 2020, and separate data for each water treatment plant - are available in [this google spreadsheet](#). It gets updated whenever new data is made available, typically each Friday.

No one can predict how this new COVID wave will go. It could fizzle out in a month or two, or it could hang around and get much worse. As with flu, prevention - in the form of an updated vaccination - is highly recommended by the medical community.
