Update On Short-Term Rentals in the DNV

In the October *Blueridge Community News*, I provided an update (current at the time of that writing) regarding proposed bylaw amendments governing short-term rentals in the District of North Vancouver. Since then, the District has conducted a public hearing on the issue (October 10, 2023) and shortly thereafter, the Province introduced legislation addressing short-term rentals on a Provincial level. After that, the District withdrew its proposed short-term rental bylaw amendment in order to begin our process over again taking into account the Provincial legislation.

The Provincial legislation is similar to the proposed District bylaws, except that the Provincial legislation has a somewhat different definition of “principle residence” (defined according to where the resident lives more than anywhere else) and, importantly, a different approach to basement suites and coach houses. Whereas the District proposal would restrict short-term rentals to units actually occupied by the principle resident (whether owners or tenants) the Provincial scheme is more permissive and allows an owner to rent out the basement suite or coach house of his or her principle residence.

Both our proposed District bylaws and the Provincial scheme mandate that operators of short-term rentals have business licences, pay special levies, and comply with regulations governing safety and regulatory commitments.

At the Public Hearing held October 10, 2023, much of the public discussion focused on this issue of renting out basement suites and coach houses. While there was general consensus as to the benefits of regulating short-term rentals and restricting them to premises occupied by the operator (“principle residences”) there were several speakers who advocated for the right to rent-out basement suites and coach houses as short-term rentals, stating that they needed to have the suites available intermittently for use by out-of-town family or for personal use during different seasons of the year. Preventing short-term rentals in basement suites and coach houses attached to principle residences was described as a hardship by some presenters given their family and economic circumstances.

The District will now hold another Public Hearing and then vote on new proposals that are aligned with the options created by the Provincial scheme. While the Province would permit us to prohibit short-term rentals in basement suites and coach houses, for my part, I will be advocating that our further-amended short-term rental bylaws align with the Provincial scheme, and permit vacation rentals in basement suites and coach houses. Such a scheme has the benefit of both consistency with the Provincial scheme as well as reflecting the input received at the Public Hearing.

The further-amended bylaws have not passed First Reading as of yet. The issue is likely to be addressed by the District Council in the early portion of 2024.

Building More Housing

Housing is front and centre in our government's legislation this autumn. Last month's article was on the North Vancouver specific housing targets set by the province, and this month we have introduced many new tools for every municipality to meet their housing needs.

The first major change is the new province-wide zoning minimums set. This applies to every residential lot in Blueridge, and will allow owners to build a duplex, triplex, or add a secondary suite and/or a coach house on their lot. Lots smaller than 280 square metres will be zoned for 3 units, and lots larger than that can build 4 units. Lots near transit centres can build even more, but this does not apply to Blueridge, or almost anywhere in North Vancouver, except around Phibbs Exchange. These changes come in anticipation of a new secondary suite incentive program which will allow homeowners to get up to \$40,000 for building a secondary suite and renting it out at below market rates for a minimum of 5 years (\$1500/1bdrm or \$1894/2bdrm). It will also be easier to build secondary suites and small-scale multi-family housing with the new Single Housing Application Service (SHAS). The SHAS will create a one-stop shop for all provincial permits required and help reduce permitting backlogs,

which is estimated to reduce permitting times by, on average, 2 months. Finally, we are also introducing new standardized designs for single-family lot developments that will further reduce permitting and development times. These standardized designs, which will be updated and added to each year, will also reduce design costs for homebuilders, allowing more affordable housing to be built quicker.

These changes are being hailed by municipal leaders as being able to tackle housing needs and housing targets without having to rely on towers and larger developments, which often come with opposition. There have been concerns about providing the infrastructure to accommodate this potential growth and fund capacity improvements in municipalities. Our government has responded to this with Legislation that allows municipalities much more flexibility with collecting funds for amenity improvements. With upfront zoning changes, municipalities can now pre-set an Amenity Cost Charge which is known to property owners and builders ahead of time as the cost for redeveloping land. This will significantly reduce the processing time for redevelopments, while also delivering more flexible funding to municipal governments to build and maintain infrastructure, as previous development cost charges were limited in what they could be applied to. Beyond this, we have also committed to financially assist local governments that achieve housing goals and see significant population growth. This has already been shown through a recently announced \$51 million municipal capacity growth fund, and the \$1 billion Growing Community Fund that was distributed in the spring.

Good Bear News!

For some time now, Holly Reisner - co-executive director of the North Shore Black Bear Society - has been writing helpful and informative articles for the *Bulletin*. This time she was travelling, so I am stepping in to provide this month's update. Don't worry, Holly approved it.

On November 16th, the North Shore Black Bear Society held their Annual General Meeting and there was good news about bears!

But first, NSBBS's mission is to:

- Reduce the accessibility of unnatural food sources to wildlife in residential areas
- Provide education about attractant management to reduce bear encounters and unnecessary bear deaths
- Maintain working relationships with the North Shore municipalities and the BC Conservation Officer Service
- Enhance the public's knowledge of how to co-exist with black bears

Quite a bit of information was presented at the meeting covering the entire north shore, but this article mostly focuses on the DNV.

During their reporting period - Nov 1, 2022 to Oct 31, 2023 - there were 1516 reported black bear sightings in the District, with only 117 reported in the City of North Vancouver and 171 in West Vancouver. Over 600 of the total sightings were related to garbage as an attractant, with organics, bird feeders, and fruit trees making up the bulk of the rest of the reports. In addition, in the DNV they received 1 report of a cougar, 20 reports of coyotes, and 3 reports of other species (bobcat, raccoon, skunk, or weasel).

NSBBS sent out nearly 2500 letters to new residents in all three cities

containing information about bears and how to best live with them. In the DNV they put up 104 bear signs and one coyote sign. They also did school outreach, training sessions, and worked with both online and traditional media to spread the word.

Now, the good news: during this period, no bears were killed in the DNV due to human/bear interaction issues. Those who have lived here for some time will know that having no bears killed in the DNV is a big deal. We can all feel good about that, but to make it happen again next year we all have to continue handling our garbage, fruit trees, and other attractants appropriately. Sadly, 2 bears were killed in West Vancouver, and 4 bears had to be euthanized due to illness or injury.

Seismic Gas Valve Update

For those not in the know, a local resident - Jennifer - is working to help interested residents install seismic valves to turn off natural gas in the event of an earthquake, which could reduce the risk of serious fires. With that in mind, she shares the following updates:

- She's heard back from the Building and Safety Standards Branch of the Provincial Ministry of Housing on the topic of seismic gas valves. They say that province "substantially" adopts content from the National Building Code which does not currently require (but does allow) for seismic gas valves. They provided a link to suggest a change to that code if desired, through the CSA Group (formerly the Canadian Standards Association). That seems a bit beyond the scope of this effort, but at least we know that these valves are welcome.
- More importantly, Pink Plumbing got back to Jennifer to let her know that they will begin contacting residents interested in this project in the new year. At the moment they are dealing with the busy season as everyone's furnace or boiler gets used to running again. So if you are on the list expect to hear from them starting in January.

False Alarm Over Chlorine Leak

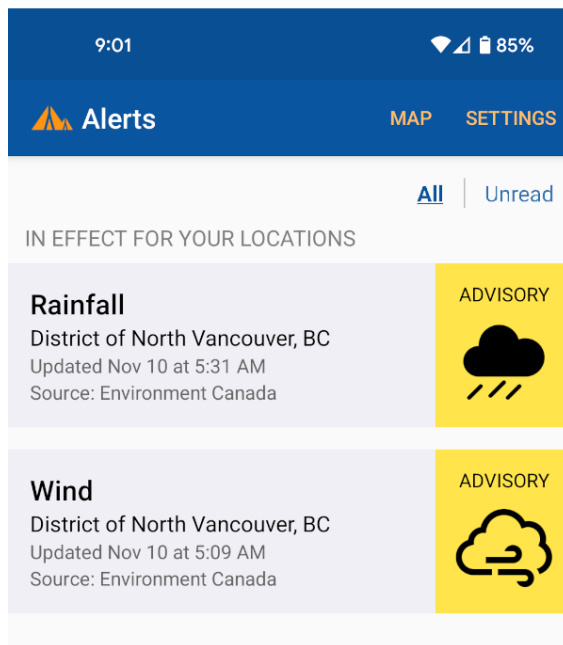
Did you hear the alarm sounding on the morning of November 1st? For some time around 10 am, an alarm wailed at the Chemtrade facility. If you were outside it could be heard from United Strangers all the way to Sechelt Drive, at least. In addition to the alarm, those of us who have the Alertable app installed on our phones were notified of a contained chlorine leak inside the Chemtrade facility.

[Thankfully, it was a false alarm.](#)

But for just a moment, imagine it had been real. Did you know about it, or how to respond?

During an emergency, accurate information is key, and North Shore Emergency Management (NSEM) is the local source for our disaster response information. The quickest way to get that information from NSEM is to install the Alertable app on your phone. It provides a range of information - selectable by the user -

on local emergencies and issues, from disasters to traffic incidents. It's NSEM's preferred tool, and it will always be faster than waiting for the evening news.



At the left is a screen capture of the Alertable app showing the rain and wind warnings sent out for the storm on the evening of November 9th. These alerts are timely and useful.

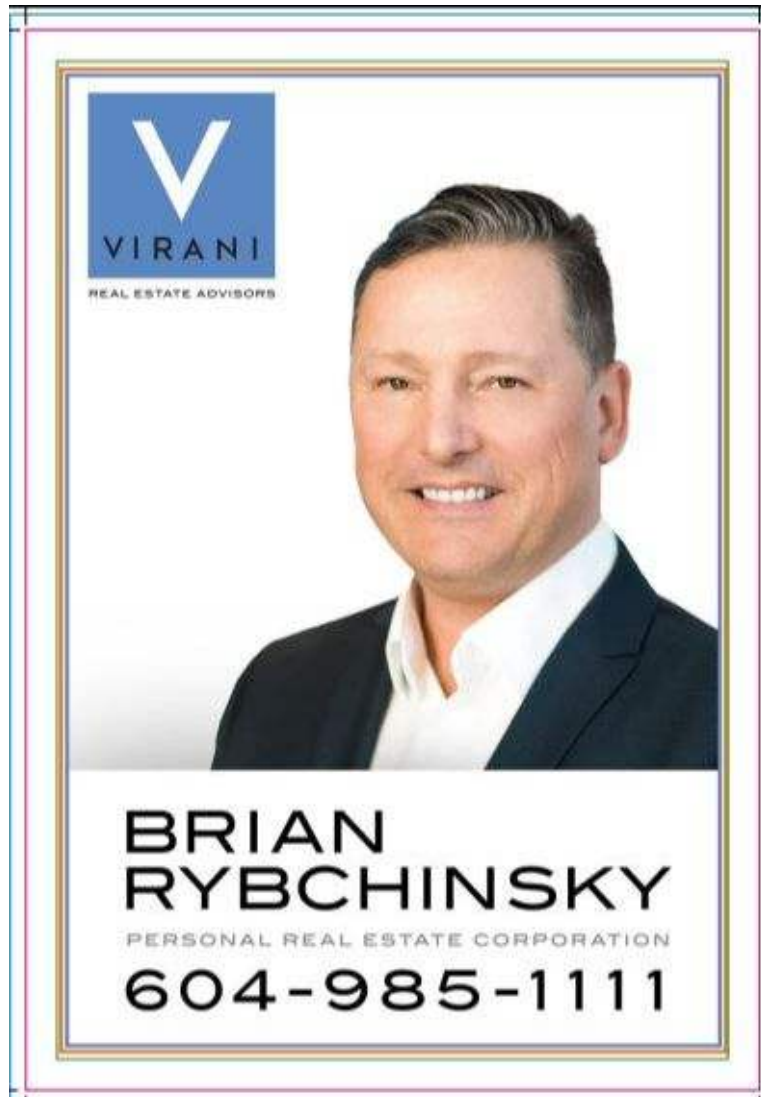
