Financial Statements as of February 29 2024 – Independently Reviewed
Treasurer's Report

Activities of the Association made further progress in its recovery from the constraints imposed by Covid19 during the previous three years. Blueridge Good Neighbour Day was held for the first time since Covid and had its best year ever, earning over \$6400 thanks to the enthusiastic support of the community and contributing businesses.

Blueridge Cares, a program first initiated for Christmas in 2021, was continued; funding was in good part from the surplus built up particularly in 2022 but augmented by further support from the community. There remains almost \$2500 which will provide a good start for the program in 2024.

On the other hand, Diner en Bleu was again postponed with the intention of re-establishing this popular event this coming summer. All we need are some volunteers to make it happen.

Overall, the Association successfully maintained its secure financial position with \$36000 in the bank, an increase over the previous year of \$7000. The main contributors to this increase were the success of Good Neighbour Day, income from advertisers in the monthly bulletin and the support of the District of North Vancouver through the contribution of \$2000 as part of its Sustainability Grant program to the popular Sharing Gardens. These grant proceeds will be used over the next few months to fund the rebuilding and maintenance of the Garden's boxes.

As always, the Association has benefited enormously from the active support of its many volunteers and the community at large. The Association remains a model of how community members with a common interest can positively impact the quality of life for its constituents.

I would like to take this opportunity to extend my thanks and that of the Board to Tosha Silver, who has once again reviewed these financial statements for the appropriate representation of the financial transactions occurring during F2024. Her review is a key element in maintaining the trust of the community in the activities of the Board as it exercises its mandate to serve the Association.
